IBEW Local 45 elected to represent photographers and reporters at KTXL-TV in Sacramento

■hings are starting to look up for some of the employees at KTXL Fox 40 in Sacramento. In July, IBEW Local 45 was elected to represent photographers and reporters at the television station, a Fox affiliate owned by Tribune Broadcasting.

"Not all unions are created equal," said photographer Tom Long, who has been with KTXL for 14 years and played a pivotal role in joining Local 45. "I just felt that IBEW was the best fit for what we were looking for and trying to do. Overall it seemed a better fit for us."

Photographers and reporters had been considering organizing for the past few years, but only recently focused their efforts in coming together. Long took the lead, talking to coworkers about the steps to take and to rally support. In May, Long reached out to Hugh McGuigan, who represents Local 45's Northern California members. McGuigan started the process of putting together an organizing campaign while educating the potential members of the benefits of joining a union. According to McGuigan, Local 45 was elected in "strong fashion."




Spotlight on Stewards

Four local 45 members who get the job done



John Breedlove, Shop Steward at KCRA-TV, Sacramento

John Breedlove has been a member of IBEW Local 45 for 28 years. His first job was in Bakersfield at Channel 17 (KPWR at the time). In 1981 he was hired at KFSN in Fresno and promoted to chief photographer there in 1984. John then went on to work at KOVR, Sacramento, and finally to KCRA in 1998. John has been sent on many special assignments, from a space shuttle launch to tornado coverage in Oklahoma City to political conventions. One recent highlight was a trip to Washington, D.C., in late 2012 for a one-on-one interview with President Barrack Obama. John's work has been recognized with San Francisco Bay Area News Awards and two Emmys. John became a shop Steward in 2012 and was on the latest negotiating team for KCRA's contract.



George Mutafyan, Shop Steward at Olive View-UCLA Medical Center

George Mutafyan works as a medical electronics technician at Olive View-UCLA Medical Center in Sylmar, north of the City of Los Angeles. Olive View is part of L.A. County's health system. George joined Olive View, and Local 45, in 2001. Maria has been a member of IBEW Local 45 since 1993, has worked for the City of Los Angeles since 1996 and has held the role of Steward for almost a decade. Maria has done various jobs, working on two-way radio equipment and monitoring equipment failures before transferring to the data group in 2001. OBJECTION PLAN INFORMATION

During the course of the year, objectors will be expected to remit the full amount of fees charged by the Local Union. However, by no later than January 31 (or as soon as possible in the case of timely mid-year objections), the Local Union will mail a check to each individual who perfects a timely objection, reflecting the deduction in the Local's portion of agency fees to which the objector will be entitled for the twelve-month period (or the period remaining in the current calendar year). Under separate cover, the objector will also receive a check from the International Office reflecting the reduction in monthly per capita payments to which the objector is entitled. The annual notice of the procedure for filing objections will be published in the October issue of The Electrical Worker. You may also access The Electrical Worker at www.ibew.org.

Notes From Around the Union: **Northern California Report**

This marks the 15th year that Hugh McGuigan has represented Local 45's Northern California members. McGuigan services San Francisco, Oakland, Sacramento and Fresno.

"Hugh has been a tremendous asset to me this year," said Local 45 Business Manager Elaine Ocasio. "He holds a lot of the history of the contracts we have had to negotiate and he has developed relationships over the years that help in the bargaining process." *Open Channels* asked Hugh about his job.

What has been your primary focus the past couple of months?

HM: Provide strong representation for our members. Enforce their labor agreements, make sure they get proper pay and treatment and just strongly represent the members of our local.

Are there one or two accomplishments you'd like to highlight?

HM: We were able to get a terminated employee reinstated through the grievance procedure. We went to bat for this employee and got him back on the job. We were pleased and proud about that. We were able to secure a premium wage rate position with GE. There are a number of things that are positive things. That's a few highlights.

Anything coming up you'd like to highlight? HM: There's a number of opened or soon-to-be-

opened contract negotiations that are going to take a lot of time and effort to complete, so that's our main tasks for the next couple of months.

Hugh McGuigan's Northern California Report:

KTVU CHANNEL 2 OAKLAND

Contract negotiations are the main focus at the station at this time. Significant progress was being made until AFTRA attempted to claim jurisdiction over VJ work. We are currently working with AFTRA and IATSE to see if reasonable compromises can be made.

KCRA CHANNEL 3 SACRAMENTO

A new contract was successfully negotiated at the station with improvements in wages and increased compensation when extra duties are assumed by MC operators. There have also been some successful outcomes to a couple of grievances at the station recently.

KRON CHANNEL 4 SAN FRANCISCO

The station continues to make investments in equipment and technology, which allows the station to compete in the marketplace. It was recently announced that the station will be merging with Media General. A labor management meeting is planned to discuss impact on the membership.

KPIX CHANNEL 5 SAN FRANCISCO

A new GM was assigned to the station in Septem-

ber 2012, replacing long-time GM Ron Longinotti. The local and the company had a long-standing good working relationship with Ron and we were sorry to see the change. A lot of emphasis at the station this year has been working to ensure the safety of members in the field. There has been a lot of crime against news personnel and meetings with the employer have been held to work on

A lot of you know Victor Marrero, who served as the President of Local 45's Executive Board for 10 years

"I hired him in February to be the Representative for the Public Sector," said Local 45 Business Manager Elaine Ocasio. "Vic brings his experience of 30 years working for the City of L.A. and much enthusiasm to his new position." *Open Channels* asked Victor about his job.

What have you been focusing on the last couple of months?

Basically I've been negotiating with the County of Los Angeles. That's the main thing I've been concentrating on the most. We've also been negotiating with Charter Communications.

What have been a couple of recent highlights?

For the county, the folks haven't had a raise for four or five years. That's the key thing, try-

ing to get the members a raise since they haven't received a raise since 2009. With Charter, we're still negotiating. It's a very tight unit. The members are tight together

What are upcoming goals?

One of the main things is we're trying to organize more shops. That's the thing that I want to shoot for.

Victor Marrero's Public Sector report CITY OF LOS ANGELES

I and an IBEW 45 Technician went to the Los Angeles County Fire Department and had a meeting with the Chief in charge of all new fire mobile installation to discuss making overtime and "call-outs" equally distributed.

I visited various Los Angeles County Hospitals to discuss new job specs for Medical Electronic

ers, and reporters were asked to do the job of photographers. He added that this January will mark the third year without a raise while the station acquired new trucks, gear and a new set.

"It really truly got to a point where the term unfair labor practices really fit," Long said. "It basically allowed them to go out and hire cheaper labor. If anybody can do your job, then they can hire anybody to do that job. We pretty much became the whipping horse. For example you didn't see producers doing the job of five people. It was just reporters and photographers. It was really just like that ongoing for the last couple of years."

Long and McGuigan said that the reporters and photographers at KTXL benefitted from interacting with others doing the same job for competing stations out in the field and learning how their working conditions differed.

"They're significantly underpaid for what they do in the marketplace relative to other IBEW

agreements," McGuigan said. "A lot of employers are able to keep their employees isolated or insulated from what goes on in other working environments."

"But when you have news photographers that mix with other news photographers from other stations on breaking news stories, they have the opportunity to talk and mingle. We made an effort to put good, strong union people in Stewards roles in those environments so that they have a chance to spread information to non-union people so they can learn what's going on, and this happened in this case."

Next up for IBEW Local 45 and the reporters and photographers at KTXL are negotiations at the end of October

"The intent is to work hard on improving the wage and benefit package that the group receives," McGuigan said. "We know that they're underpaid and the goal is to get them a reasonable wage rate and benefit package that's commensurate with the work they do."

Technicians.

I filed a complaint with the Los Angeles County CAO Office about fire fighters programming portable radios at all County Fire Stations. Jurisdiction states that this is part of the Electronic Communication Technician spec job. I also spoke with Chris Hannan from the LA/OC Building Trades about this violation and he will help me settle this issue.

We started negotiations with the Los Angeles County on July 18, 2013 After various negotiation meetings with Los Angeles County and the LA/OC Building Trades, we are near completion.

LOS ANGELES COMMUNITY COLLEGE DISTRICT

I settled a grievance at Los Angeles Community College where a member was not able to take comp time past July.

Working with members to promote membership participation at various colleges.

LOS ANGELES UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

I participated in a school board meeting to keep the funding so that our members will have no furloughs or layoffs.

We are having a shop meeting with our members to discuss trouble and try to resolve issues in Labor/Management meeting.

KGET (BAKERSFIELD)

Meeting with our members to discuss their concerns after the station has been taken over by a new owner. We are working with our members to find them work after elimination of master control.

KERO (BAKERSFIELD)

Elaine and I met with members at the stations where they are upgrading the station. We spoke with the General Manager who informed us that they are going to be hiring two new technical directors.

KBAK

Working to provide members training to keep them at a high standard of competence in our Broadcast Industry.

CHARTER COMMUNICATIONS

We are negotiating with Charter Communications for a renewal contract. Your Business Manager Elaine Ocasio and myself have met with our members to discuss various issues that affect working conditions and safety. Charter Communication member participation is very high and well attended at our shop meetings.

the news desk before landing his current position. He's been a union member since he started working.

As an assignment editor, Doyle monitors a bay of scanners, listening to what's happening in the world of fire and police. If something starts to go down, he investigates to see if it's newsworthy. If so, he consults with producers, and a determination is made if a chopper or reporter needs to be deployed. A brush fire near the Hollywood Freeway that gets helicopter coverage was likely first heard on a scanner by someone such as Doyle.

Rodney Foster also works as an assignment editor and coordinates logistics. He been a union member since joining the station in June of 1985. He's been on the job during such big events as the Cerritos midair plain crash in 1986, the '92 civil unrest following the Rodney King verdict, the '94 Northridge earthquake, the O.J. Simpson White Ford Bronco chase and numerous fires. Doyle added that the Northridge Earthquake of 1994 stands out in his memory. He arrived at work as it struck, finding tiles blanketing the newsroom.

That was a busy day.

Both Foster and Doyle appreciate the work that the union does.

"The main thing the union does is our contract, just establishing what can and can't be done," Foster said. "There are certain rules."

Doyle added that Local 45 representation is something he can turn to when needed.

"They're always there if there's some sort of trouble," Doyle said. "I look at them as some place you can turn to if you've got a problem and need some advice."

Drew Weaver is a technical engineer at KCBS/KCAL's Technical Operation Center. He works in front of a Mission Control type expanse of monitors. One screen shows the Santa Monica shore, another Downtown L.A., another the U.S. Capitol, and others show popular programming such at "The People's Court" and "The Talk."

"It's really a technical person's dream," Weaver said. "With this place, we have a system that's set up unlike anything else in the world. We can put anything we want on."

Weaver has worked at the station for 17 years. He too was grateful for having Local 45 in his corner.

"As far as financially they've helped out," Weaver said. "Whenever they have to go into negotiations, they're always weighing out what's best for us. They take the leadership role in figuring out what's best for us in the long run. I give them credit for doing that for us."

Weaver added that he felt that working at KCBS/KCAL was like being with family.

"The great thing about it, and I guess that's with every place that you work at, are the people," Weaver said. "Everybody has those moments when work isn't always the greatest, but you come in and it's like a family. It's been a great environment in that aspect."

When it comes to getting the news out, Foster takes pride in the important role that usually unheralded assignment editors hold.

"There's something special about being part of dispensing information to people," Foster said. "I'm part of the history too. There's something special about it that makes it seem like it's more than just I'm answering phones and telling people where to go. It feels like there's something significant about it."

what could be done to ensure a safe work environment.

KVIE CHANNEL 6 SACRAMENTO

KVIE is a PBS station and has experienced a significant reduction in viewer contributions and corporate sponsorships. The members are in the final year of their contract and we are hopeful that economics will be improved by the time we enter our next round of negotiations.

KOVR CHANNEL 13 SACRAMENTO

It took the filing of an Unfair Labor Practice charge with the NLRB to finally force the employer to the table and bargain towards a new agreement. The employer made a substandard proposal on wages that was unanimously rejected by the membership.

KSEE CHANNEL 24 FRESNO

The station recently underwent an ownership

change. The new owner -- Nexstar -- is now moving two other stations onto the KSEE property. This is a positive development for the station and is likely to improve job security. We are currently in negotiations with the new owner towards a new agreement.

KFSN CHANEL 30 FRESNO

KFSN continues to be the market leader in Fresno. Members are entering the final year of their CBA and will be seeing a wage increase. November of last year saw the retirement of long-time member Chuck Hoover.

GE GREATER BAY AREA

We have seen employment numbers improve since the last contract negotiations. Member Pete Anderson has been recognized two consecutive years as the number one technician in the country. A grievance was recently won to preserve a premium wage position with the employer.

DAY WIRELESS BENICIA

The company continues to see a slow down in work. Much of the work done by the technicians at Day Wireless is dependent upon government and municipal money and there has been a lot of cut backs in that area. After negotiations with the company, a new contract was ratified.

CBS/FOX SPORTS EMPLOYEES

Several site visits were made this past year to meet with members employed in the production of major sports productions. We are seeing the potential for work increases in the area and continue to work to secure additional work for our members.

ORGANIZING

The Local continues to work on organizing the unorganized throughout the entire area of the union's jurisdiction.
